The Cambridge City Council met in open and public session at the Cambridge Community Building, 722 Patterson Street on Monday April 4, 2022 at 6:30 P.M. REPORTS OF OFFICERS, BOARDS AND COMMITTEES:

<u>a.Utility Supervisor Report</u> - Dave Houghtelling reported on the following: he has sprayed the cemetery with pre-emergent; the Hydro Kleen sewer camera project is complete, the project did plug the pumps at the sewer plant; recommended selling the 2015 line truck which is not being used; and an employee has resigned. The position will be advertised.

b. City Clerk/Treasurer Report – Kandra Kinne reported on the following: She attended Clerk School from March 16 – 18; a topic of discussion at the financial session of Clerk's School was whether foundations should be included in the annual audit; a resolution to guide office staff on requiring "cash only" accounts after receiving insufficient funds checks; and liquor license renewals should be an agenda item for City Council to approve the publishing. Other items to report are a meeting with the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources about flood plain management and ordinance – some changes are needed in the ordinance; financial reports are included in Council packets; and that Piper Sandler was able to refinance the Combined Utility bond which saved \$23,127.89, and the water bond was not refinanced.

NEW BUSINESS:

a.Ordinance No. 799 – An Ordinance amending the Cambridge, Nebraska Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations Reports of 2015, Revised August 2020; Amending Article 2, Section 2-503 Conditional Uses adding Automotive and Truck Sales; to repeal other conflicting ordinances and sections and direct the publication or this ordinance and to provide an effective date – Third Reading. Derek Raburn stated the motion, seconded by Jeff Ommert, to approve Ordinance No. 799 on third reading Amending Article 2, Section 2-503 Conditional Uses adding Automotive and Truck Sales. Mayor Gunderson read the Ordinance by title. Voting yes were Tony Groshong, Jeff Ommert, Derek Raburn and Mike Harris; absent and not voting were Vernita Saylor and Kevin Banzhaf; none voted no. Motion carried unanimously by City Council Members present for the third reading of Ordinance No. 799 as follows:

Ordinance No. 799

An Ordinance amending The Cambridge, Nebraska Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations Reports of 2015, Revised August 2020; Amending Article 2, Section 2-503 Conditional Uses adding Automotive and Truck sales; to repeal other conflicting ordinances and sections and direct the publication of this ordinance and to provide an effective date.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CAMBRIDGE, FURNAS COUNTY, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. The City of Cambridge, Nebraska Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations Reports of 2015, Revised August 2020 amending Article 2 "C-1" Commercial District, Section 2-503 Conditional Uses Adding Automotive and Truck Sales.

Section 2-503 shall read as follows:

2-503 CONDITIONAL USES

The following conditional uses may be permitted Subject to approved procedures outlined in these Regulations.

A. Motor vehicle repair service, provided that all work shall be performed and all materials shall be stored within an enclosed building; and provided further that all operable or inoperable motor vehicles determined by the building officials to be a safety hazard or

Visual blight shall be screened from public view and access by a solid or semi-solid fence having a minimum height of six feet and a visual density of no less than ninety percent (90%).

Motor vehicle body shop, provided that all work shall be performed and all materials shall be stored within an enclosed building; and provided further that all operable or inoperable motor vehicles determined by the Building Official to be a safety hazard or visual blight shall be screened from public view and access by a solid or semi-solid fence having a

- minimum height of six feet and a visual density of no less than ninety percent (90%).
- B. Storage and warehouse except for products of a highly explosive combustible or volatile nature.
- C. Communication Towers.
- D. Restricted (Adult Entertainment) Businesses.
- E. Wholesale establishments, except those which handle products of a highly explosive, combustible or volatile nature.
- F. Manufacturing or fabrication establishments, which are not noxious or offensive by reason of vibration, noise, dust, fumes, gas, odor or smoke.
- G. Welding and blacksmith shop.
- H. Feed and Seed Stores.
- I. Trailer Sales and Display.
- J. Storage containers, provided that they are used only during construction and prior to the

issuance of a Certificate of Occupation.

- K. Automobile and Truck Sales.
- Section 2. Upon adoption of this Ordinance, The Cambridge, Nebraska Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations Reports adopted April 20, 2015, Revised August 2020 by the City of Cambridge, Nebraska shall be amended to add Items to section 2-503 Conditional Uses.

Section 3. Any other ordinance of section passed and approved prior to passage, approval

and publication of this ordinance and in conflict with its provisions is repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

- b. <u>City Clerk/Treasurer & Museum Director</u> Betty Kruger has advised that she is retiring from her position at the Cambridge Museum. Kandra will prepare an ad for the position. A hiring committee was formed City Clerk/Treasurer Kandra Kinne, Assistant Clerk MiKayla Kent, Councilman Vernita Saylor and City Attorney Lisa Shifflet for interviews for the position of City Clerk/Treasurer.
- c. <u>Sales Tax for Golf/Swimming Pool Sunset 2025</u> In 2010 voters approved raising the sales tax by one-half percent to benefit the golf course and the swimming pool. Tobiann Springer was present to ask about splitting the sales tax 50% to Golf and 50% to pool or suggest 1/3 to pool and 2/3 to golf. Mayor Gunderson suggested re-naming the portion to the City for recreation instead of just for the swimming pool so that funds could be used for other recreational projects in the park. The one-half percent was split ¾ to the Cambridge Golf Course and ¼ to the swimming pool support. In order to continue this tax, an ordinance is required authorizing the election on the General Election in November. Council agreed to keep the same split. Attorney Lisa Shifflet will prepare the ordinance.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS, BOARDS AND COMMITTEES:

Ambulance/Fire Report: John Kutnink reported the following: there were 11 ambulance runs in March; the power lift is installed; manufacture of the new ambulance will start in May and the ambulance will be delivered in July.

ADJOURNMENT:

Tony Groshong stated the motion, seconded by Derek Raburn, to adjourn the City Council meeting at 7:22 p.m. Voting yes were Tony Groshong, Jeff Ommert, Derek Raburn and Mike Harris; absent and not voting were Vernita Saylor and Kevin Banzhaf; none voted no. Motion carried unanimously by City Council Members present.
